IB Diploma off to a great start

As a Europhile, I have never been shy to share my dismay at the Brexit result and we have felt the impact this term. The paperwork, required documentation and visa requirements for teachers coming from the UK has proven to be extremely laborious. As part of the process we are now finalising the documentation for our teachers and they are now back in the UK where they need to wait for their visas. We have appointed some excellent teachers for next September, as we increase our subject range at IGCSE and IB and needless to say we have already started their visa applications!

Magical Arts

So many good things have been going on this term but a particular highlight for me were the Christmas concerts in Primary and Secondary. I would like to thank Miss O'Connor and Mrs Foreman in particular for putting together these high quality performances. I love Christmas and feel that concerts such as this are truly magical. Children who may start the year saying they don't want to be in the choir, quickly realise how much they enjoy it. We value the Arts, as you know and we ensure that the Choir has protected time on the curriculum; as such we look forward to more concerts in the future. It was also the first public outing of the Secondary BCG Quintet who performed beautifully too. It is such a shame that parents were not able to attend in person but please do watch the recordings - they really are super!

Drama and Art have also played a huge part this term. The numbers for GCSE Drama and DP Theatre are extremely high and these subjects have proven to be very popular with the students. The Year 7s, 8s, 9s, and 11s have all performed this term. The Art studio is well worth a visit if ever you have the opportunity. The students are encouraged to explore their ideas and experiment with a range of media whilst also being taught the key skills required to make beautiful art. I am passionate about the Arts and I am particularly pleased that we are developing these areas in the school and providing these creative opportunities for the students.

Sport Success

This term has given us the opportunity to get out and about a little more than we have been able to over the last year. In particular we have had sports fixtures with BSB both home and away. After losing the first few matches in a variety of sports, BCG started winning and currently we lead 7 games to 3! Academic

I have enjoyed reading the students' reports and it is pleasing to read the insightful comments from the teachers. Whilst some students clearly need to focus more, especially when doing independent learning at home, the large majority are making excellent progress. There have been assessments and projects for most of the school over the last few weeks and then after the holidays the Year 11s and Year 13s get into the serious business of Mock Examinations. Whilst some rest and family time is important, especially at this time of year, these students must work hard and ensure they are fully prepared for these very important exams.

Lots of work has been going on to help our Year 13 students find the right university for next year. The current cohort have made applications to the US, UK and Holland as well as Spanish Universities.

TOK EXHIBITION

On Monday, year 12 presented their first practice Theory of Knowledge Exhibition. The Exhibition, which will form part of their overall assessment in May 2022, requires students to choose a prompt from a prescribed list of 35. These prompts are open-ended and philosophical, inviting the students to ask whether bias is inevitable in the production of knowledge; to what extent our values affect the acquisition of knowledge; and the ways in which material tools influence knowledge. Once they ´ve chosen a prompt, they have to find three real-world objects that demonstrate this philosophical conundrum. The students had a little over a week to prepare this and came up with original and diverse objects ranging from the Sefer Refuot, to a photograph of The Beatles on a Japanese tour, to The Rock ´s tattoos, to an airplane boarding pass, to a Vegan Menu from Alive Vegan Restaurant. The students then presented their objects and the links between them to Years 10 and 11.

INDIVIDUAL ACTING LESSONS

The Performing Arts department now offers individual acting lessons in preparation for the LAMDA (London Academy of Music and the Dramatic Arts) exams which can be taken in June. Natalie Rosewood is a professional actress and experienced teacher who has already taught several BCG students who have gained the highest level of "Distinction" in their exams.

Lessons are 15 euros per session, once a week, and will take place either before or after school, or during the day on a rota system (a different time each week so as to avoid missing the same class each week). I'm Natalie, a professional actress living and working in Catalunya. I have a wealth of work and experience in film, TV and theatre all over the world and I have a huge passion for teaching drama to young people. I am excited to announce that from December I will be offering professional specialist private LAMDA Acting classes.

What is LAMDA?

Founded in 1861, LAMDA is the oldest drama school in the UK. They started to offer examinations in speech and drama to the public over 130 years ago. Since then they have developed an enviable reputation for excellence in the provision of Communication and Performance examinations in the UK, and they are rapidly extending their reach internationally. I am very excited to be able to offer them in Spain!

What does it entail?

I will be teaching Acting classes which will lead to an exam at the end of the school year.

Depending on the grade chosen, each student will prepare two or three monologues with my guidance, which they will then perform in their end of year exam in front of an official LAMDA examiner. The examiner will also ask them theory questions related to their performance which I will prepare them for in class.

Why choose LAMDA?

Acting exam learners develop their vocal physical and interpretive skills while they delve in to characters and explore the background of dramatic texts. Alongside producing authentic performances of their chosen scenes they also gain an understanding of the context and characters within them. As students progress through the grades they learn development of clear speaking and character portrayal, leading to understanding of Playwrights styles, appreciation of subtext and the influence of a playwrights style in the higher grades.

It is also highly beneficial for those students who aren't necessarily interested in pursuing a career in acting, as it still teaches them useful skills such as clear diction, breathing techniques, confidence and public speaking.

To begin with I would have a session with each student to determine which grade would be best for them to start with based on their skills. Grades 6, 7 & 8 are medal grades and are worth UCAS points which can contribute towards successful applications to British Universities!

Drama is an effective tool for exploring challenging themes within a safe and fictional environment. Our KS3 students have spent the last 3 weeks sharing their thoughts, ideas and experiences of bullying with each other in drama class and examining how ways of overcoming bullying can be communicated through performance. Each of us has put ourselves in the place of the bully, the victim and the bystander and students have shown sensitivity, understanding and emotional intelligence in the responsible way they have worked together to create these important moments of theatre.

As they have worked on their devised pieces or interpretation of texts, students have consolidated their knowledge of performance strategies and techniques, including the use of tableau, soundscape, split stage and how to use stage directions for clarity and impact. We were thrilled with their performances and look forward to similar projects in the future.


