MUN 2024

For many of those who participated MUN 2024 may seem a distant memory, so we thought this month we'd provide a short refresher, courtesy of a select group of our Year 9 students, who were tasked with reporting the event. On the 9th of February 2024, we went to the Oak House School to see how part of this event played out by interviewing multiple people who participated in the Model UN. We didn't only interview students from our school, as some students from other schools were kind enough to allow us to interview them too. But first things first, what is the Model UN?

The Model United Nations (MUN) is an organisation to imitate the United Nations so that students can get an idea of how the world, and its politics, works. This time, it was held at the Oak House School and the director of this event is Ms Morrit, although it is mainly organised and controlled by the students themselves.

This started in that year 2020 after some of the Oak House School students had attended a Model UN in Madrid. They had liked the idea so much that they wanted to have their own Model UN.

The Model UN works the exact same way, if not then a very similar way, as the actual United Nations. Each student has their own country to represent in a selected topic, they can't choose which one they want to participate in. For example, Martin in Year 10 represented India within the topic of Redesigning Women's Football. By interviewing more students, we found that sometimes it can be a struggle, as delegates of countries can't say their own opinion in the debate, as they have to say their country's, which is not always the same.

There are two days in which the students went to MUN: the first day was to get introduced to the topic and how everything will be done. Then they give their own prepared, 90 second speech introducing their country and its point of view to the rest of participants, in which they always have to start with "Honourable chair, fellow delegates", and end with "The delegation of (country) yields their time to the chair". The second day, they participate in the debate. They form alliances with other countries before starting the collective argument. The goal is find a resolution that passes successfully



of the implementation of positive change, and to work together to find a solution.

Now, we all know that taking part in Model UN can be very good, but for what exactly? What doors can this open? Not only does Model UN help you academically by improving your problem solving, teamwork and communication skills, but it also gives you confidence and the ability to present your thoughts in an organised, persuasive and clear way. Those are all key things people find very helpful for your career and generally in life.

We think that Model UN is a very effective and important way of learning, opening many paths and helping in many ways. Even though it seems nerve-racking, stressful and maybe even a bit frightening, we would definitely do it when we get the chance in later years and even recommend it to others who get the opportunity. It seems like a really good way to connect, learn and problem-solve. And if the academic reasons don't convince you, that's not a problem either. You get to meet people from other schools and sometimes even from other parts of Spain. This year we managed to interview students from our school, some other British Schools from Catalonia and a homeschooled student from Madrid.

So with all our honesty, we really recommend this experience and we hope to have sparked some interest in you all.




IB CAREER-RELATED PROGRAMME
